



The exhibition at the Ferry Avenue Branch of Camden County Library System will be a retrospective of children's artwork initiated by Art Aware as well as recent work initiated by art teachers in public, parochial and charter schools.

Children are absorbing their environment every minute of every day. The atmosphere in the art room with the art teacher is the most creative time of the school day. Tech Tips

ike so many of us today I'm on the Internet/Web a good bit of time. Often I'm working, but I also enjoy getting on the Internet in my free time. And--like so many of us-sometimes I know exactly how to get where I need or want to go, but sometimes I need help! When I do need help, I find the advanced search features of the Google search engine really useful.

Here's an example of a search I might do for a student who needs a quality website. This particular process will limit my search results to web pages done by educational institutions.

- 1. Go to the Google Introductory web page at: www.google.com Then, look at the top on the right and click on the icon (tiny picture) of a gear - to the right of the phrase "Sign in". From the dropdown menu, click on the phrase "Advanced search".
- 2. In the text box near the top and to the right of the phrase "all these words", type in "native plants new jersey"
- 3. Near the bottom, in the text box to the right of the phrase "Search within a site or domain", type in .edu
- 4. Click on "Advanced Search" near the bottom towards the right.

Upon doing this search I discovered that Georgian Court University has some great information on plants native to the New Jersey Pine Barrens at: http://www.georgian.edu/pinebarrens/index.htm

A number of colleges and universities have excellent online information about plants, gardening, historical artifacts, dinosaur bones—and that's just scratching the surface of what is available





Interested in Your Genealogy?



enealogy is a very popular interest among people of all ages and backgrounds. In today's world, finding information out about our ancestors is easier than ever with the proliferation of online sources. While not everything is online (for example, birth and death certificates can't be found online in NJ due to privacy concerns), you can use sources such as Ancestry Library Edition and Heritage Quest to start your family research. Ancestry Library Edition is similar to Ancestry.com, the popular online tool available for purchase at home. Users have access to years of census images, military records, and various other primary and secondary source documents. Ancestry continually updates its database with new sources and images for users to search.

Heritage Quest is a database which provides access to census images, PERSI (genealogy and local history articles index), and various other sources. One important source is the Freedman's Bank index. The Freedman's Bank was founded to serve African Americans and includes the names of people who banked there, making it a good starting point for those beginning their research.

These two sources are free to use at the library. You can even access Heritage Quest from your home computer with a valid Camden County Library card. Ancestry Library Edition is only available for use inside any of the library branches. Ask your librarian for more information on accessing these two databases and get started researching your family tree!

Luka and the Fire of Life by Salman Rushdie

Blending together an eclectic number of influences into a rewarding narrative, Salman Rushdie's Luka and the Fire of Life is a follow-up to his previous tale Haroun and the Sea of Stories. The yarn begins in the same fanciful town of Kahani and draws its hero from the same peculiar family. However, this time we follow the exploits of the younger of the Khalifa brothers, Luka, whose journey plunges the reader into the World of Magic in an against-all-odds effort to capture the Fire of Life, the wondrous essence that is Luka's only hope for saving his ailing father.

Truly amazing is Rushdie's ability to be childlike without being childish and to capture the logic and vigor of a juvenile with prose that feels no less than adult. Wordplay abounds and is, in fact, even predictable and repetitive (i.e. the constant explanation that Luka's dog is named Bear, while his faithful bear is named Dog). The reader cannot help but be amused. The book is modern myth at its finest. Lively, accessible, and witty, it is a joy to read for young and old alike.

Brave New World by Aldous Huxley

When Voorhees Speculative Reader Book Chat selected

Brave New World by Aldous Huxley, it prompted me to revisit the book, which I hadn't read since college or high school. It meets the test of any true classic. The book yields something new on re-reading it years later. Most readers are struck by the accuracy of Huxley's dystopian view of the future. I always recall one of the precepts in his future society - "consume, consume, consume." Buy the new and throw out the old. It sounds familiar, especially in a time when we hear about our "consumer-driven" economy.

What I am struck with on rereading the novel is how much it
deals with and comments on the
spiritual nature of people caught in
the customs and comforts of modern
(post modern) western society.
Despite all the social conditioning
and social engineering, the savage's
mother still confronts the terror of
death, so much a part of the human
condition, and some might say the
existential experience. It's all satire,
and like any good satire, it reflects
truths we'd rather not see and raises
questions we'd rather not ask.

I also recommend Huxley's companion piece Brave New World Revisited, a collection of essays written by the author twenty-five years after the publication of the novel in which he looks back and sizes up how accurate his predictions of the future of society turned out.
